Dates to Remember:

Gold Star Mother's Day Sept 28

The origin of what would become Gold Star Mother's and Family's Day started with a simple accessory: a black armband with a gilt star. During World War I, family members would wear these armbands to represent a loved one who had died in the war. The stars would later find their way to being displayed on banners that were hung in windows or front doors. Banners with blue stars were hung to represent immediate family members who were serving. Some would have one star; others would have two or three. The stars symbolized the people who were supposed to be home but were missing from the dinner table. If a family member died during their service, the blue star would be replaced with a gold one.

Grace Darling Seibold was one of these mothers with a gold star in her window. Her son, 23-year-old George Vaughn Seibold, volunteered to be an aviator and was sent to England in 1917 as part of the British Royal Flying Corps. Grace and George had regularly exchanged letters until she suddenly stopped hearing from him. Nevertheless, she held out hope. In 1918, she received his personal belongings and confirmation of his death. George's body was never identified.

Grace then used her time and grief to reach out to other mothers trying to cope with similar losses. Twenty-five of these women banded together in 1928 to create American Gold Star Mothers, Inc. — a group that still exists today — to honor their children, heal together, and support veterans and the nation. In 1936, Congress designated the last Sunday in September as Gold Star Mother's Day (now known as Gold Star Mother's and Family's Day).

Patriot Day Sept 11

Patriot Day is a National Day of Remembrance that commemorates the victims of the 9/11 attacks on the World Trade Center in New York City, the Pentagon and United Flight 93, which crashed in Pennsylvania. Established by a joint resolution of the U.S. Congress and signed into law by President George W. Bush in December 2001, Patriot Day serves as a reminder of the impact of that day on the nation and the world. It is a day for Americans to honor the memories of those who perished, to pay tribute to the bravery of the first responders, and to reflect on the values of freedom, democracy, and resilience.

US Air Force Anniversary, 1907 or 1947 Sept 18

The United States Air Force was established as a separate military branch on September 18, 1947, following President Truman's signing of the National Security Act. This landmark event officially formed the Air Force, though the act itself was signed on July 26, 1947. The history of aviation in the military started August 1, 1907, as the Aeronautical Division of the US Signal Corps. Later known as the Aviation Section, Signal Corps (1914); US Army Air Service (1918); US Army Air Corps (1926) and the US Army Air Force (1941).

Founders Day Sept 29

That commitment began on Sept. 29, 1899, in Columbus, Ohio, when a group of veterans met to address the urgent needs of their brothers-in-arms. September 29 marks 126 years since 13 Spanish-American War veterans gathered in a small tailor shop in Columbus, Ohio, to discuss how they could assist their fellow veterans and the dependents of their fallen comrades. Motivated by seeing veterans struggle without post-service health benefits, thirteen local veterans met at a tailor shop owned by Francis Dubiel and formed the organization that would become the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW). James Romanis inspired by veterans he saw while working at a pharmacy outside Fort Hayes, led the meeting and wrote the group charter. Learning from earlier groups, membership was open not only to current but also future veterans of all ranks. Today the VFW has 1.5 million members and continues to champion the needs of veterans and promote their interests.
